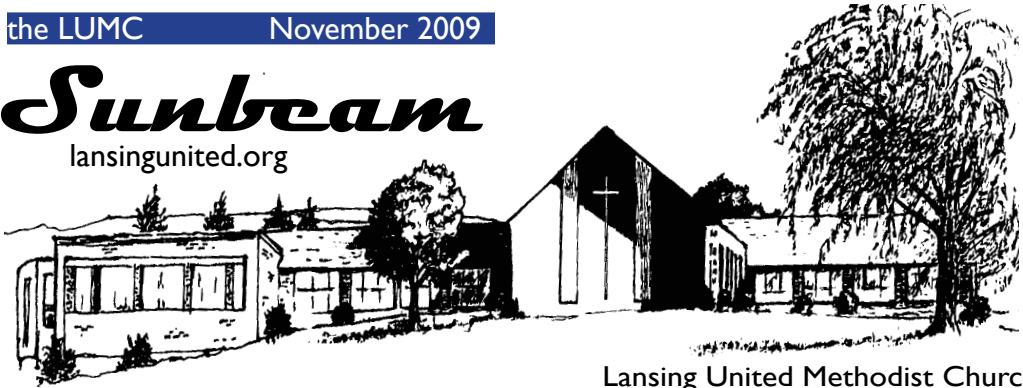

“Selfish” Giving

“People want to make the world a better place to live. They want to believe that they can truly make a difference for the better. There is embedded in us, it seems, a desire to finish out our work on this earth with a sense that we amounted to something. To sum it up, people want to be a part of something that changes lives.”—J. Cliff Christopher’s Not Your Parents’ Offering Plate: A New Vision for Financial Stewardship

This month marks the twentieth time I’ve participated as a pastor in a church’s annual finance campaign (read about “Consecration Sunday on page 8). My involvement has always been significant but varied. I’ve written all sorts of letters and preached any number of sermons. One year I volunteered my cat to be featured in some promotional piece having to do with the campaign. I can’t remember in what way or to what effect. The cat was cool with it, so I guess it was okay.

But each of these years I’ve also participated in a more significant way than as part of the campaign leadership team; I, along with Dori, have been a giver. Each year we sit down and look at what we have available to give and determine what portion we’ll offer to God through the church. On the Sunday designated by the church we place our completed estimate of giving card in the offering plate. For me this action is one of the most significant and transforming acts of worship in which I engage each year. It grows me and blesses me in so many ways.

I shared this reflection once with someone who heard it with pretty cynical ears. “Yeah, well, you’re the pastor of the church. You’re

expected to do all that.” I made sure to set this person straight. “Only a couple of people in the church know anything about my giving,” I said. “If I wanted to, I could easily get away with doing virtually nothing. But I don’t because I’m selfish: giving adds to my life.”

That last bit about being “selfish” took my hearer by surprise, but I bet you know what I mean. When you and I give to our church, we take a stake in all the good God does through this congregation. We get to be a part of every Sunday School child’s Christian education. We help the choir obtain new music and the Trustees patch the parking lot. We help fund every worship service, food pantry distribution and Christmas pageant. And through the portion of our giving that gets passed on to the wider church, we send volunteers with Volunteers in Mission into flooded communities. We buy mosquito nets to keep children in Angola and the Philippines free of malaria.

Our giving connects us to all of this and more. It enables you and me to make a real difference in real lives. It makes us partners with a God who is always seeking new ways to bless and renew. And I want that. Don’t you?

Does that make us “selfish”? Well, not in the way we usually use that word. I think it means we have a soul that is fed on compassion and generosity.

Looking forward to feasting our souls in the days ahead!

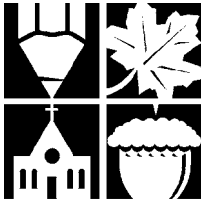

Worship in November

Last year at this time the eyes of the nation were focused on November awaiting a Presidential election many anticipated would be epoch making. Without the urgency and importance of a Presidential election, this November might feel much more ordinary than last year's. The only scheduled national event of which I know is the end of daylight savings time on November 1st (meaning we must turn our clocks back an hour). That said, you and I really follow two calendars: a secular one and a liturgical one. According to the liturgical or church calendar, November is actually an extremely eventful month, with All Saints' Sunday (11/1), Consecration Sunday (11/15), Children's Sabbath (11/22), the Ecumenical Thanksgiving Eve Service (11/24), and the First Sunday of Advent (11/29). For us each of these Sundays marks a deeply meaningful and transforming event in the life of faith. These Sundays give us the opportunity to honor our deceased loved ones, offer our financial gifts to God through the Church, praise God for the gift of children, join with other sisters and brothers in Christ in shared thanksgiving, and begin again to prepare for the birth of Christ into our lives. November turns out to be pretty important after all.—*P.B.*

November 1: All Saints Sunday. Read Isaiah 25:6-9; Psalm 24; Revelation 21:1-6a; John 11:32-44.

November 8: Twenty-Third Sunday after Pentecost. Read Ruth 3:1-5; 4:13-17; Psalm 127 and Psalm 42; Hebrews 9:24-28; Mark 12:38-44.

November 15: Consecration Sunday (see page 8): 1 Samuel 1:4-20; 1 Samuel 2:1-10; Psalm 113; Hebrews 10:11-14 (15-18) 19-25; Mark 13:1-8.

November 22: Christ the King; Children's Sabbath; Bible Sunday. 2 Samuel 23:1-7; Psalm 132:1-12; Revelation 1:4b-8; John 18:33-37.

November 24: Ecumenical Thanksgiving Service 7:00 PM at Asbury Church, Assembly of God, 2978 North Triphammer Road. Read Joel 2:21-27; Psalm 126 (UMH 847); 1 Timothy 2:1-7; and Matthew 6:25-33.

November 29: First Sunday of Advent. Jeremiah 33:14-16; Psalm 25:1-10 (UMH 756); 1 Thessalonians 3:9-13; Luke 21:25-36.

Counting Our Blessings

Surely one of God's greatest blessings is our children. Jesus said, "Let the children come to me." (Mark 10:14) Every child is a child of God. Glancing around our church you will see that the children play a vital role in the Sunday worship service as they eagerly participate as greeters, acolytes, ushers, and singers. We as a congregation are more blessed because of them.

On Sunday, November 22, we celebrate Children's Sabbath. The Children's Sabbath is sponsored by the Children's Defense Fund, guided by a multi-faith advisory committee, and endorsed by hundreds of denominations and religious organizations. The National Observance of Children's Sabbath began in 1992 by celebrating children as sacred gifts of God. This yearly event provides congregations with a reminder to renew their commitment to care for, protect, and advocate for all children. The Children's Defense Fund's Leave No Child Behind mission is "to ensure every child a healthy start, a head start, a fair start, a safe start, and a moral start in life and successful passage to adulthood with the help of caring families and communities." During worship, as we sing, pray, and hear God's word, we are

reminded that it is our sacred responsibility to protect all of our children. The theme for this year's Children's Sabbath is "Create Change for Children Today: Bring Hope and a Better Tomorrow." Millions of children are living in poverty and they need us to create change today. "Creating a better world for children today brings hope and a better tomorrow for all of us."

Here at LUMC, on Children's Sabbath, we also celebrate Bible Sunday. Bibles are presented to children in the third grade during the worship service. We are asking parents to please let us know by calling the church office if you would like your child to receive a Bible. Jesus created and cared for the little children. Let us count our blessings as we care for His creation.—*Marilyn Paradise*

Consecration Sunday Is Coming

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's finance committee has selected the **New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program** as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. **New Consecration Sunday** encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every person who completes an **Estimate of Giving Card** does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend even if they feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and governing board members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

Thanks in advance for your enthusiastic participation in Consecration Sunday events.

Lansing Food Pantry Update

[Editor's note: I asked food pantry leader Nancy Myers how things are going, considering the economic situation. Here's what she said.—gw]

Lansing food pantry operations are going well. We have had two new volunteers, one from All Saints and one from another Catholic church in Ithaca. They have both been wonderful. They come in early on food pantry day and help set up and unload the truck and whatever else they can do to help. They both seem to want to help in any way they can. The new plan of not setting up on Sunday and just doing it on Monday morning is working well. It is the efficient way to do it. We served 75 families in September with a total of 185 people. It has grown but that was to be expected with this economy. We have generous people who not only donate food but money as well. In a past food pantry Matt Dedrick called to ask if he could donate acorn squash. Voila! He appeared with four bushels of squash. Life is good.—Nancy Myers

How to Help the Food Pantry

This time of year is particularly important for donations. Next time you're at the store think about: Canned or packaged dinners, canned fruits or vegetables, packaged desserts and snacks, baking supplies, egg noodles, packaged rice, canned meat or fish, other assorted pastas, macaroni and cheese, soups, crackers, peanut butter, jelly, cereal, fruit juices, powdered milk, baby food, baby cereal, coupons for diapers, bath soap, toilet paper, toothpaste, shampoo, and dish and clothes detergent. Or make a monetary donation and the food pantry people will take care of the shopping for you.



UMCOR responds to three emergencies

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) is responding to people affected in the Philippines, Samoa and Indonesia following three disasters this week. UMCOR's top executive, Sam Dixon, says, "Our prayers are with the people who are hurting as a result of this devastation. UMCOR is committed to addressing their needs and especially reaching out to those who are most vulnerable."

Philippines Typhoon

UMCOR Philippines is working with its local partners including Action by Churches Together (ACT) and the National Council of Churches to provide relief to those affected by Typhoon Ketsana, also called Ondoy, in the Philippines.

UMCOR Philippines is distributing emergency provisions including bottled water, blankets, canned fish and rice. UMCOR Philippines anticipates expanding the response through local and international partners in addition to partnering with the Manila Episcopal area including local church disaster response coordinators. Support for UMCOR's relief work in the Philippines can be made through **Philippines Emergency, UMCOR Advance #240235.**

Samoa Tsunami

Four powerful tsunamis generated by a huge undersea quake crashed into Samoa and American Samoa. UMCOR's Domestic Disaster Response unit has been in touch with FEMA and with the California Pacific Annual Conference of which American Samoa is a member. More than 32,000 people are displaced and 147 people are confirmed dead.

Bishop Mary Ann Swenson reports that there are no United Methodist Churches in Samoa but that there are many Samoan pastors in Cal-Pac and other places in the US. UMCOR is assessing the needs and exploring ways to respond to the disaster. To help people affected by the Samoa Tsunamis, support may be offered through UMCOR's US Disaster Response. **UMCOR Advance #901670.**

West Sumatra Earthquake

A major earthquake struck West Sumatra on September 30, 2009 causing major damage to the provincial capital of Padang and Pariaman District.

UMCOR established its field offices in Indonesia following the December 2004 tsunami. Country operations are based in Medan with field offices in Banda Aceh and Bireuen. UMCOR is working closely with its partners in the area, including Church World Service to assess the needs and coordinate an appropriate response.

UMCOR Indonesia continues to help those affected by the 2005 tsunami and the 30 year conflict preceding it. To support the relief efforts, please give generously to **Indonesia Emergency, UMCOR Advance #217400.**

For this reason, our Camps, Conferences & Retreat Ministries has created the Campership Fund (Code #1705, in the conference benevolences).

This fund enables children coming from families who cannot afford to pay the full amount of the summer camp fee, to receive a Campership from Camps, Conferences & Retreat Ministries for the purpose of attending one week of summer camp at Aldersgate or Casowasco.

We try to serve as many children as possible. Each year between \$18,000 and \$25,000 is needed to fund this program. The bigger the fund, the more children are able to go to camp.
