

From the Pastor

Being a Disciple

↑ s I reported in this space last month, I Aspent several days in early July reading, writing, and pondering what's involved in a church's ministry of disciple-making. It was a fruitful time for me. I managed to read and take notes on four books, which isn't bad. Haven't been able to digest that much material in such a short span of time since college! But more than covering material, I found my passion for spiritual formation rekindled. Growing in Christ and helping others grow in Christ is what makes my heart sing.

Jeff Jones, one of the authors I read last month, captured the heart and soul of disciplemaking this way. He said, "The best way any of us can serve another person is to aid them in becoming the person God intended them to be." To aid others in becoming the person God intended them to be—I think that's an excellent definition of the core mission of a congregation. It assumes at least three things: (1) God has vision for each life; (2) This vision can only be realized with the help of others; and (3) God wants the church to be among those who provide such help.

A couple of the "big questions" I pondered (and continue to ponder) include this one: How does our church help a person discover God's vision and move toward it? We do both things at LUMC, you know. An example I used in a sermon back in July involved the "transformation" of 6-, 7-, and 8-year-old VBS participants into 12-, 13-, and 14-year-old VBS workers. The change came about not simply with the passing of years. These children who became youth needed a church who'd tell them "you are God's servants" and then make a place for them to serve! Your church does that.

And we can do more. God has a dream for each and everyone of us. What can we as a church do to help one another see and live into that vision? Be thinking and praying along with me as we seek God's next steps for our work together.

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Worship in August

We have the soul? We know quite a bit about healthy eating and its impact on the body; but what sort of "bread" do we need for the soul? I'd also ask you to take note of the resistance Jesus encounters in this chapter. Though he speaks the truth and offers a way to gain real and lasting life, many don't want to receive what's good for them. They're kind of like the little kid who won't eat his carrots, even though mom says they're awfully good for him. What soul-nourishment are you finding "hard to swallow?" Being regular at worship? Finding a set time to pray and read Scripture? Seek out someone who's wronged you (or you've wronged) and making it right? Trusting God to be God and make a way for you? Let's "gather 'round" the Word, the Table, and the Font in August and find some nourishment for the soul.

August 2—Ninth Sunday after Pentecost: We'll celebrate both the Holy Baptism and Holy Communion today. Read: 2 Samuel 11:26-12:13a; Psalm 51:1-12; Ephesians 4:1-16; and John 6:24-35.

August 9—**Tenth Sunday after Pentecost**: Read: 2 Samuel 18:5-9, 15, 31-33; Psalm 130; Ephesians 4:25-5:2; and John 6:35, 41-51.

August 16—Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost: Read: 1 Kings 2:10-12; 3:3-14; Psalm 111; Ephesians 5:15-20; and John 6:51-58. August 23—**Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost**: Read: 1 Kings 8:1, 6, 10-11; 22-30, 41-43; Psalm 84; Ephesians 6:10-20; and John 6:56-69.

August 30—Thirteenth Sunday after Pentecost: Read: Song of Solomon 2:8-13; Psalm 45:1-2, 6-9; James 1:17-27; and Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23.

Report from Ghana: Rockin' with Obama

Peace Corps isn't easy. Sometimes (more often than not) things don't go well. You miss your friends and family at home along with cheeseburgers and ice cream. You challenge to adapt to a new culture, language, and foods. You can get miserably sick, lonely, discouraged, and frustrated on a regular basis. But despite all these challenges, sometimes I can't help but think that choosing Peace Corps as the next step in this journey we call life, and being blessed with going to Peace Corps Ghana, was by far the best decision I've ever made. It's not for everyone, but I've certainly been a lucky girl, and while I can't wait to come home and see all of you, the day I leave Ghana will be a sad one.

So a bit about my last few weeks and what the next few months hold for me.

Camp GGLOW

I joined together with a few neighboring Peace Corps Volunteers to do a weeklong leadership camp for middle school aged boys and girls from our towns and villages. Camp GGLOW (Girls and Guys Leading Our World) was exhausting, running around after a bunch of kids ages 13 to 20 (yes, all middle school) for a week, but a huge success. We had sessions on setting goals and planning for the future, sexual health and HIV/AIDS, study skills, saving money and budgeting, gender issues, staying in school, making good decisions, and much more. The kids took a tour of the local hospital, learned how to open their own bank account, did arts and crafts, and enjoved being kids. So often Ghanaian children are forced to grow up much more quickly than they should—one of our students at camp was the mother of a 2-year-old daughter. Most

children in Ghana are responsible for their younger siblings, cooking, cleaning, washing clothes, fetching firewood, and much, much more. They don't have much time to study, relax, or simply goof off. There are no violin lessons, play dates, after school clubs, or parent chaperoned dances. It was great being able give the kids a week full of fun and learning.

My Primary Project

I work with a small microcredit lending agency in my town. My time spent here has been devoted to training our employees to better manage the business and help people receive access to loans, to improve their businesses. I wrote a proposal a while back requesting funds to purchase a basic office equipment (computer, printer, etc) for our office to better manage accounts and the business. Thanks to some of your generous donations I will be purchasing the equipment and installing it this week. Progress is delightful.

In the works

We are still waiting on final approvals and funding for my grand idea of a mobile HIV/ AIDS awareness campaign using a boat to reach the remote island villages on Lake Volta (the world's largest man-made lake). It's frustrating having to wade through Peace Corps bureaucratic mess, but I can't wait. The goal is to have the two-week event come on the last two weeks of September. I'll let you know how it goes!

Looking forward to August

I'm travelling with a friend to to a big festival in the Southern part of the Volta region. Many of my friends and people in town are originally from this town and go back every year the first

With songs we celebrated everything, from God's power to His "Amazing Love." Thanks to you, we have a CD of this fantastic music to keep our VBS experience alive.

We've heard that a lot of people have a tough time understanding the Exodus story, but we know they wouldn't if they could have been with us when Pastor Bill and Mrs. Paradise explained it. The God we know doesn't send plagues, but He had to back then

because most people didn't know Him and He had to show them the hard way that He is the one and only Lord. We met Pharaoh—he was just plain stubborn and defiant. God gave Pharaoh chance, after chance, after chance, and warned him clearly what terrible things would happen if he didn't obey. God also promised to protect His people throughout all of these terrible trials. God kept His promise and the most terrible plague of all passed over the Hebrew families, who painted lamb's blood above their doorways. We took a short journey into the New Testament to see that God gave us our own Passover lamb in Jesus, whose sacrifice has saved all of us. Wow! Then we got to see the happy ending (or new beginning?) of the Hebrew people being freed and leaving Egypt, thanks to God's miracle of the parting of the Red Sea.

We got to take turns helping to prepare snacks for the whole group. We also got to tell everyone about the snacks and what they meant. One example was "burning bush in a bowl." At the Crawfish Crafts station, we made "Fear Not" bracelets or pulls and a Lantern

During the week, we also participated in a mission project inspired by God's leading His people to the new home He promised them. We brought in donations to help pay for the cost of interior doors in the new house. Every time we had enough to pay for a door, we painted a cardboard door. When we started, we were hoping to paint enough doors to have one with every color of the rainbow. When we finished, we'd gone well beyond

Soon I head to the beach for a week-long close-of-service conference. September 18 will mark 2 years for me in Ghana, and after that its just 2 more months!

All Peace Corps Volunteers were invited to see Obama's closing remarks as he was leaving Ghana. We met at the U.S. Embassy, received our tickets, and boarded buses to go to the airport, where we would see him off. We waited around on the buses for awhile before passing through metal detectors to the area reserved for Embassy staff and Peace Corps Volunteers. We waited around for awhile, and enjoyed taking pictures with Air Force One before his arrival. He cruised in on a helicopter from Cape Coast, where he had toured the slave castle, and joined the Ghanaian president, Atta Mills, on the podium. It was tough being all the way over in Ghana during the elections, and talking to Andrew Whiting on my cell as he watched Obama's inauguration. I felt like I was missing a lot of things, but being able to stand 20 feet from where Obama gave his speech on US/Ghanaian relations, and his shout out to the Peace Corps, made missing everything else seem like no big deal. He and Michelle shook hands, and boarded Air Force One, and we all waved goodbye.
