### The Season of Advent

The Season of Advent marks the begin-**I** ning of our church year. Advent starts on the fourth Sunday before Christmas Day, which this year is November 28, and ends on Christmas Eve. The entire season centers on the celebration of the birth of Jesus the Christ in his First Advent and the anticipation of the return of Christ the King in his Second Advent. "Advent is celebrating a truth about God, the revelation of God in Christ whereby all of creation might be reconciled to God." It also symbolizes our spiritual journey as individuals and as a congregation. We affirm in our faith that Christ has come, that He is present in the world, and He will come again. As a congregation we have traditional events during Advent that help us prepare for the celebration of Christmas.

The adult Sunday School class begins a two-part **Advent study** on Sunday, December 5, with Pastor Jane. Why is

#### Lessons from Haiti: Faith vs. Fear

When my wife and I travel to Haiti, it seems God's still, small voice becomes easier to hear. Perhaps it is the absence of television and radio, or maybe it's going to bed at 8:00 and waking with the dogs and roosters sometime between 2:00 and



4:00 AM.

was no different. For two weeks we were teaching in an English School in St. Marc and staying with missionaries Gary and Carolyn Walker. Our first Sunday there, Carolyn was preaching at the church they attend which is "under construction." Actually we sat on plastic chairs under blue tarps on a level terrace carved out of a hillside.

Her sermon was on "fear not." As Psalm 27:1, 2 states, *The Lord is my light and my salvation. Whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life. Of whom (or what) shall I be afraid?* Are we under God's care? Are we letting Him direct our steps? As I looked out over the mountains across the road, everything seemed so peaceful and right. But, oh, how quickly things can change! Two days later the yard in front of St Marc Hospital was full of bodies on blankets with IVs hanging from tree branches. Death was once again visiting Haiti, this time in the form of cholera.

It would have been easy to give in to the fear that could be seen on nearly every face. People were fine one day and dead the next. Yet God was calling us to be faithful, not fearful. Faithful action was called for, not paralyzing fear. So in school the next day, we gathered together, sang praises, and prayed to our Lord and savior. Our voices, 100+ students and teachers, could be heard all over our hillside neighborhood. What a witness! to praise God in the midst of fear and suffering. The preschoolers sitting near me watched as tears rolled down my face as I sang and prayed with these strong, faithfilled people. Later we taught about hygiene, safe food, and clean water. Teachers went and cleaned and washed preschool toys with bleach water. There was peace and power in going to God and seeking His direction. Cholera is dangerous and deadly, but we have a good shepherd. If we seek Him, He will lead us, and use us for the benefit of His people. Fear is from the devil. Faith is the answer.

We may struggle with different fears than those in Haiti, but fear still tries to creep into our lives and steal our joy and peace. Financial fears, health fears, relationship fears can paralyze us. Or we can face these challenges with faith knowing God is with us. Thank you Haiti, I needed to hear that loud and clear.—Pete Loveland
