

For God, the Time Is Always Now

o, here we are at the beginning of a new program year! A Dedication for a Dedicated Servant of God

new retreat cabin sized for a small family or an individual was dedicated at Camp Casowasco last June. The fireplace in the cabin, known as the Proskin Cabin, was dedicated to the memory of a former member of LUMC.

You'll know this person if you've been at LUMC for many years, and if you have joined in the last few years, here is an introduction and some clues to who this person was:

- She was an enthusiastic supporter of Casowasco, both in fund raising and leadership. Bob Stoppert (then camp director) once convinced her to do a second week when she had just finished a week of Outreach, her favorite camp and her specialty.
- Her set of values was clear. When someone complained about the length of a worship service, she replied, "But it is a privilege to be here as long as is needed."
- She also counted it a privilege to give to the church.
- Her creative services for the Park gave vitality to our worship there. These included clown ministry, Native American worship with prayers to the four points of the compass and drumming, and scripture read as drama. If you were there you'd never forget George Broadwell as David and Roxanne Thompson as Bathsheba. She also sewed the bright green "Welcome to Worship" banner that we still use.

- Traveling the world was high on her priority list. This lady visited all the continents except Australia—she went to China and Hong Kong, Russia, and Bolivia. Several VIM trips to Africa, included one during which she personally took the proceeds from our first talent auction to Zimbabwe for the startup funds for the new African University. Her other African stops were Nairobi, Mozambique, Kenya, Burundi, and South Africa.
- Taking part in weekend workshops and retreats were part of a constant striving for renewal and excellence: "Men and Women of the Bible," "Therapeutic Touch," "Marriage Encounter," and anything about worship were favorite topics. She and her husband were the first members of our congregation to attend a Jesus Seminar workshop.
- Trained as a geologist, she discovered that there were no jobs for women geologists in that day. She turned her considerable intellect to other pursuits, including those listed here. She could explain to you the difference between an esker, a moraine, and a drumlin.

You may have already guessed that the person honored by the Casowasco fireplace dedication is Martha (Marty) Cockram. With her husband Bob and three young children, she joined LUMC in July 1971. Marty's service of remembrance and thanksgiving was conducted at LUMC by Rev. Martha Swords on December 12, 2002.—

Sunday School and Bible Studies Begin

Tou are invited to **bring your back**packs with you to church on Sunday, September 5, to receive a blessing during worship as you begin a new school year. Here at church we are beginning a new journey as well. Join us on Sunday, September 12, for the Sunday School Kick-**Off and Brunch** in the Fellowship Hall following the morning worship service. We are excited to welcome our new pastor, teachers, and assistants to be leaders in our programs. Carrie Makela will assume the role of Chair of the Children's Ministry Committee and the committee will meet after the brunch in the Bible Center classroom. It's shaping up to be a wonderful year!

Children's Sunday School begins with a unit entitled "Lost and Found." Children will hear how God's love is always there for them, no matter where they go or what they do. The lesson will be explained through three parables: The Lost Sheep, The Lost Coin, and the Prodigal Son. In each of the stories God's presence is felt among his people as an animal is recovered, a coin is found, and a relationship is restored. Each story is an example of how God rejoices when the lost is found.

Pastor Jane leads the **adult Sunday School class** and discusses excerpts from one of her favorite books entitled, "How To Pray After You've Kicked the Dog," by Dr. Terry Teykl. Teykl, a former pastor, is now a conference speaker on the topic of prayer. He asks why do so many people who believe in God have so little faith in prayer? Why are we skeptical about talking to God?

Teykl offers us this prayer:

Clear away the dead growth of the past;

Break up the hard clods of custom and routine.

Stir in the rich compost of vision and challenge;

Bury deep in my soul the implanted Word.

Cultivate and water my heart,

Until new life buds and grows and flowers. Amen.

■alling all 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th graders—Our first Kids in Action Now September 12, from 4-5:30 PM in the adult Sunday School classroom. We have lots of exciting plans to make a difference in our community and world, and we will have lots of fun doing it together. We'd also like to invite your family to join your K.A.N. kid(s) after the meeting for a supper meal and then the Fireplace contemporary service in Fellowship Hall from 6-7 рм. The contemporary service is an especially enjoyable and informal setting for families to worship together. The kids love the music and we'll include some VBS selections this month. About K.A.N.

The goal of K.A.N. is to involve kids in the helping ministries of our church, first by learning about specific programs and then by participating in activities to support those programs. We combine those activities with some fun too! In the past year, K.A.N. kids have been involved in many projects, including: the Crop Walk, assembling school kits for the Church World Service program, aiding the food pantry with the giving tree, as well as publicity and donation collection for a national grant program, making signs for Habitat for Humanity, raising funds to sponsor a elementary school child in Haiti, raising funds to buy mosquito nets for Africa in conjunction with Nothing But Nets, games afternoons at Woodsedge, and helping with the spring rummage sale.

It's been amazing to see the impact these caring souls have on the helping ministries of our church when we let them contribute their boundless energy and enthusiasm. While allowing kids to get involved in helping others, K.A.N. also develops what we hope will be a lifelong understanding of outreach programs and possibilities within the church. An added benefit for the kids has been getting to know the adults in our church who are dedicated to making these helping programs work. These young people are at the perfect age to catch on fire with our Wesleyan heritage of reaching out to those in need, and we're very excited to offer them this opportunity to experience the joy of serving Christ in our world.

Thanks to everyone who helped out with the Lansing Youth Missions snow cone sales and Harbor Festival bounce house to support Nothing But Nets. You helped raise about \$300, which will support the Youth Missions trip to Guatemala next year, and raised enough money to buy 39 nets, saving that many families from life-threatening malaria. That means we've purchased over 100 nets so far with our direct efforts, and even more unseen through our efforts to make people aware of this life-saving program. 

This 32-week class is designed to delve into the connection between memory and identity as the people of God, by focusing on the major and minor Old Testament prophets, with the exception of Daniel, and the thirteen letters traditionally attributed to Paul. "The prophets and Paul are continually calling hearers and readers back to their God and to a sense of who they are as a people 'set apart."

Disciple Bible Studies provide in-depth and powerful insight into God's beautiful handbook. Designed for daily study, they also provide a disciplined approach for including the Bible into our daily lives, enriching us beyond belief. Classroom time is a small group seminar to discuss each week's lesson, with a short video presentation by Biblical scholars. Time is devoted to delving into the passages studied for the week, as well as considering how these passages speak to our own practice of discipleship.

There are many stories, some here in our church, about how Disciple has transformed the lives of people and their congregations. We, as the body of Christ, are tremendously

blessed when the members of a congregation are shaped by a shared knowledge and understanding of the whole biblical story and their connection to THE Story. Here's how one Disciple graduate described her experience:

Just as a visit to a place I've never been changes that image in my mind's eye forever—so has my journey through God's word changed me forever. I hear Scripture, sermons, Sunday school lessons with new ears and eyes. Church World Service Update

We are asked to assemble **school kits** for Church World Service, because the supply is running short. Due to recent storms and earthquakes, the need continues. School kits are needed in Pakistan, Moldova, and Liberia, not to mention areas in the U.S. recently affected by damaging weather. In Pakistan particularly, the torrential rains and flooding in August left an estimated 1,600 dead and 14 million affected. Some 1.5 million people are now homeless.

Here is where Church World Service is working in Pakistan:

CWS in Pakistan is working in Swat, Kohistan, D.I. Khan, Shangla, and Mansehra districts of Khyber Pakhtoonkwa Province; Sibbi district of Balochistan Province; and Khairpur district of Sindh Province.

As well as implementing directly, CWS is partnering with Participatory Village Development Programme, Help in Need, known as HIN, VEER Development Foundation and Nations Capacity Building Programme, known as NCBP.

Assistance includes food and non-food relief items, emergency shelter and basic health services. The core of the response remains providing direct assistance in the following allotments:

- Food and non-food items to 55,500 individuals, or approximately 7,500 households,
- Shelter kits to 17,500 individuals, or 2,500 households, and
- Health care kits to 26,500 individuals, or approximately 3,500 households.

School Kits

- One pair of blunt scissors
- Three spiral or tape-bound 70-count pads or notebooks of ruled paper 8-1/2" X 11" (or 8" X 10 1/2"), containing 200-210 sheets of paper. No loose-leaf, filler paper, please.
- One 30-centimeter ruler (12")
- One hand-held pencil sharpener
- · Six new pencils with erasers
- One large eraser
- One box of 24 crayons (no more, no less)
- One 12" x 14" plain or patterned cloth bag with cloth handles, to hold the above items. (Please, no commercial or other logos on the bag.)

Health Kits

- One hand towel (about 16" by 28", not a fingertip or a bath towel)
- One washcloth
- · One wide-tooth comb
- One nail clipper (no metal files or emery boards)
- One bath size bar of soap, in wrapper
- One toothbrush, in original packaging
- Six Bandaids
- \$1 to buy toothpaste later

Regarding the toothpaste, instead of donating tubes that may go out of date, donate a buck to cover the cost of buying a fresh tube just as the kit is actually distributed.

Note: Due to international shipping and import regulations, the kits cannot have substitutions, but must have exactly the items specified. With the cost of shipping, you are encouraged to make a donation of \$1 or \$2 per kit to help ship them.
