Wesley's Passion for the Poor

John Wesley's "passion for the poor" is the theme approved by the General Conference of the United Methodist Church for 2011's observance of Heritage Sunday, on May 18 this year. Consequently, if you have been in our Fellowship Hall at any time in the last four months, you have seen a series of bulletin boards describing how groups of LUMC members have followed in Wesley's footsteps. Members of this congregation have joined together in a variety of ways, showing their compassion both in our neighborhood and in the wider world. Some congregation members have their own personal projects, which have remained private.

The first display was lifted from the General Assembly's power point lecture covering the first 300 years after John Wesley. This presentation explains Wesley's understanding that Social Justice must be a piece of the plan to conquer poverty. That concept has remained a cornerstone of Methodist teaching.

The Church was once sued by the Readers Digest and others for using donations given to relieve poverty to support the poor working on social justice issues. The Methodist Church proved its point and won the suit.

The intent of depicting these projects is to reflect on how John Wesley's work with and for the poor is reflected in our own congregation 300 years later. How many of us have packed our bags for Haiti or Johns Island with eagerness? How could we not have given Head Start or the Food Pantry a home?

Wesley believed in education. His pamphlet on hygiene and home remedies is still in print. He gave compassion and material gifts to the poor. He preached social justice so vehemently that some historians give him credit for the fact that Great Britain avoided a revolution such as the French had.

It was out of Wesley's inspiration and dedication that Francis Asbury came to these colonies, was proclaimed a bishop, and rode with local circuit riders through our area. On Monday, June 29, 1807, he preached at the Milton Methodist Meeting House, in an area much later to be called "Lansing," when the Town of Milton was subdivided. It was on that spot that Asbury Church was built, one of our original five Lansing Methodist churches. By reflecting on and celebrating this heritage, we can better understand the church as it shapes us today.—Mark Meal and Kate Payne, Historians, with thanks to Laurie Moskow and Connie Conlon for technical assistance with our displays



to give back what they have been given was cut short due to lack of sufficient funding. Presently we are operating by faith alone from month to month and semester to semester.
