

From the Pastor

Not Just Another Pretty Place

The Kingdom of God is not what we **I** think it is. We think we can find it in the pleasant stories of the Bible, like in the birth of a baby, but it is sometimes in the ugly discussions in the Bible and in the church that we actually experience the Kingdom. One of the best books I have read about church in recent years makes this point even in its title: Dirty Words: The Vulgar, Offensive Language of the Kingdom of God, by Jim Walker (2008, Discipleship Resources). Walker, an ordained United Methodist elder, is pastor of Hot Metal Bridge Faith Community in Pittsburgh. Walker rejects the antiseptic church where the overriding desire is to censor unpleasantness. He would rather follow Jesus in a way that gets his hands dirty. That is where he finds the Kingdom.

In his book, he recounts hearing a "church expert" say that the three things a church needs in the 21st century are multimedia capability, communicative signs, and an excellent website. "I thought, 'What does this have to do with the kingdom of God? Why should the growth of the kingdom of God depend websites and signs? Why should it depend upon anything other than Jesus?" Walker suggests that people think of the church as a store. "The church is a place to find goods and services. Some look like the old hardware store on Main Street, some look like the area convenience store, and some look like Wal-Mart. No matter what form it takes, we still consider church a store where the pastors are the employees and the

parishioners are the customers. And as we've been taught, the customer is always right."

Walker suggests that the church of the future must have the *opposite* characteristics of a store. "The future church looks more like a bridge than a store. The buildings, the money, and the leadership are all still part of it, but they are peripheral. Church isn't a destination; it's a movement, a pathway, a bridge. Think about the difference between a store and a bridge for a moment."

"The church's job is to connect people with God by living Christ's life. Yet we don't think of it as a bridge, but as a place of business. The church is meant to be walked on by people so that they can connect to Jesus Christ."

We modern day Christians often pride ourselves for being a "looking good" church. We like having a public persona of looking good and keeping anything unpleasant at bay. But that may not be the way to the Kingdom. Sometimes the path is through the muck and destruction. After my house fire, I was walking through the ashes and the mess when suddenly there in the middle of it were daffodils and violets pushing up through the muck. Out of all that destruction, something was made beautiful. That is where we find God, in the ordinary, in doing dishes, in baking cookies, and sometimes in the dirt—in the ugly discussions that we as a church have to have in order to find our way to God.

We need to remember that the Kingdom is not something that happens in a perfectlooking church. It happens in our hearts. It happens because of Jesus...it is what makes the difference for us as Christians. The Kingdom doesn't necessarily happen because we gather on Sunday mornings. It happens in a soup kitchen, in a hospital, or under a bridge where a homeless person lives. It happens in the helping hand, the unexpected visit, the phone call, the kind word spoken. It happens in prayer, in laughter, in tears. The Kingdom is found in the everyday-ness of our lives. May we seek the Kingdom in the ordinary, in the simple ... and in the imperfect.

New Disciple Bible Study Opportunity Beginning in the Fall


When: September 2012 - June 2013 (34 weeks)

This 34-week class will take us through the biblical stories of Creation to the New Jerusalem. "Becoming Disciples through Bible Study" gives equal time to both the Old and New Testaments, emphasizing the wholeness of the Bible as the revelation of God. Session topics, theme words, theme verses, and major persons, events, and topics will all help you set the sequence of the biblical story in your mind. The principal Scripture for each session follows the chronological movement of the biblical story.

LUMC has sponsored several Disciple Bible Study groups over the years, and participants will tell you about both the commitment and learning that results. Disciple provides in-depth and powerful insight into God's beautiful handbook. Designed for daily study, Disciple provides a disciplined approach for including the Bible into our daily lives, enriching us beyond belief. During the class, you and your small group will discuss each week's lesson, with a short video presen-



tation by Biblical scholars. Time is devoted to delving into the passages studied for the week, as well as considering how these passages speak to our own practice of discipleship. This study is the foundation for a variety of studies in the Disciple series.

There are many stories about how Disciple has transformed the lives of people and their congregations. We, as the body of Christ, are tremendously blessed when the members of a congregation are shaped by a shared knowledge and understanding of the whole biblical story and their connection to THE Story.
