

Trip to the Holy Land

Can hardly believe that a trip I have thought about for years is finally coming to pass!! By the time you are reading this, I will be two weeks away from going to the Holy Land...I am so excited, I can hardly stand it! When this trip was just an idea, I hadn't really thought about the timing; I am awed to realize that I will be in the Holy Land during Lent.

I can't even begin to imagine how this trip will influence my preaching for the remainder of Lent—watch out!

I am reminded of other trips I have taken and how anticipation and planning influenced the experience...not always in a good way. This time I am not concerned about language issues since I will be traveling with a group. I'm not worried about lost luggage since I have already done a "test packing" (seriously!) and can manage with a carry on. We have not been inundated with reading material or preparation meetings, so I don't have lots of preconceived notions of what to expect. I'm not worried about my kids or my dog. Everything is looking great...

So, when Dick Barton (our District Superintendent and the group leader for this trip) asked me where in the Holy Land I would most like to lead devotions, it set me into a tailspin! What??? Where would I want to do devotions? I told him it had never crossed my mind, but after thinking about it for a while, these are my choices: at Jacob's well where Jesus asked the woman for a drink, where Mary and Elizabeth stayed together before Jesus and John were born, and across from the Temple in Jerusalem where Jesus saw the widow place her pennies in the collection. And now, as I look at these choices in writing, I realize they all have to do with marginalized women...hmmm, is there a theme here?

I promise that I will keep a meticulous journal of this trip (including any frustrations I encounter along the way!). I promise that I will keep you all in my prayers during my travels. I promise that I will share my experiences with you to the best of my ability. And I promise that I will look for Jesus every step of the way.

Moses and the Great Escape...

And if your son asks you in the future, saying, What are the testimonies, and the statutes, and the judgments, that the Lord our God commanded you? You will say to your son, We were slaves to Pharaoh in Egypt; and the Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand. The Lord gave signs and wonders, great and harmful, against Egypt, against Pharaoh, and against all his household, before our eyes: And he brought us out of there to bring us in, to give us the land that he promised our fathers.—Deuteronomy 6:20-23

During February and March Adult Sunday School will explore the story of the Hebrews' escape from Egypt, as told in Exodus, Chapters 1-15 and the holiday of Passover. Passover was one of the most important holidays that Jesus would have celebrated during his lifetime.

Pesach (PAY-sahk), known in English as Passover, means to pass through, to pass over, to exempt, or to spare. It refers to the fact that God "passed over" the houses of the Jews when he was slaying the firstborn of Egypt.

Passover is one of the most commonly observed Jewish holidays, even by otherwise non-observant Jews. According to the 2000-01 National Jewish Population Survey, 67% of Jews routinely hold or attend a Pesach seder, while only 46% belong to a synagogue" (www.Jewfaq.org).

It is widely believed that the Last Supper was a Passover Seder. A Seder is a Jewish service celebrated in the home and includes a special meal. The text for the Passover Seder is written in a book called the haggadah. The haggadah tells the story of the Exodus from Egypt and explains some of the practices and symbols of the holiday. While the actual Passover Holiday begins March 25 at sundown, we will gather for a Passover Seder at LUMC on Friday, March 22, at 5:30 pm.

Young Adults Are Invited to Apply to Enter United Methodist Mission Programs

Young adults between the ages of 20 and 30 can submit application materials from now through February 15 for long-term mission assignments in one of two mission programs managed by the United Methodist General Board of Global Ministries (GBGM).

Mission Interns commit to 25 months of service, including 20 months of international service.

US-2s commit to two years of service in the United States.

Applicants must have a bachelor's degree or equivalent life experience, feel called to address the root causes of injustice, be open to new settings and new perspectives, want hands-on experience living in Christian community, and feel called to serve with, not to or for others.
