# From the Pastor

# **Christmas Surprises**

have a friend who loves planning surprises. He enjoys the challenge of organizing people and things covertly, and seeing the shocked look on someone's face when they are surprised.

His wife, however, does not like surprises. My friend has had to learn (the hard way) that his spouse enjoys the time of looking forward to and anticipating things much more than she appreciates being surprised. It is not only that she likes having time to prepare for whatever item or experience is coming, she also likes spending days with a sense of anticipation that something good is going to happen.

Advent and Christmas have elements to please both those who like to be surprised and those who prefer to prepare and wait. Longstanding seasonal traditions provide plenty of instances of waiting for what we know will happen; and the inevitable changes of plans when multiple people and multiple events are involved provide plenty of unexpected experiences!

For those who endeavor to prepare and wait, Advent provides four weeks to consider what in our lives is in need of redemption. Advent study and prayer may shine a light on the actions to which God is calling us, and it may bring us to acknowledge our need for a Savior. Many in our congregation will be using *God is in the Manger: Reflections on Advent and Christmas*, a book of daily devotions for Advent with readings from scripture and from the writings of Dietrich Bonhoffer.

For those who like surprises, Advent provides many unexpected reversals: a Messiah who comes not as a warrior but as a baby, born not to an established, prestigious family but to unwed immigrants, greeted not by royals but by lowly shepherds, and put to sleep not in a place of honor but in an animal's feeding trough. It is a time of considering how God changes the world through changed hearts and minds: turning despair into hope, disdain into love, sorrow into joy, and conflict into peace.

The biggest surprise of Advent may be that even for those of us who know the story and think that we are prepared, God's Love continues to find ways to surprise us, appearing in the most unlikely situations.

Who knows? God's Love might even use us to bring hope, love, joy, and peace to the world around us.

May it be so this year.

All Adult classes will gather during this season of waiting in the Adult Classroom. Raised in a an upper middle class family, Dietrich Bonhoeffer was sent to the gallows for preaching the Gospel of Christ, rescuing Jewish people as a double agent, and opposing Hitler. He had escaped to America, where he studied and lectured, but he felt it his duty to return to "stand with the Christian people of Germany," as he put it. He died at the age of 39, one month before the German surrender in World War II.


