Paul's Message to Us

aint Paul has given us a lot to think about in his letters to new Christian communities. As I go back to sharing the Ten Commandments for Pastors Leaving a Congregation, by Lawrence Farris, I am struck by how often the letters of Paul are referenced!

Commandment Four is "thou shalt affirm thy congregation's ministry" and is opened with these words of Paul from 1 Thessalonians 1:2-3 –

We give thanks to God always for you all, constantly mentioning you in our prayers,

Remembering before our God and Father your work of faith and labor of love and steadfastness of hope.

You have done some impressive work here over the past six years. You have welcomed many new members to our congregation and have had the painful experience of saying good-bye to many old members. You have come through a self-study process that has affirmed your past and led to dreaming the future. You have laughed together and cried together. You have disagreed with one another and have come to places of consensus with grace. You have allowed ministries to find their own identity with your prayers and support. You have accepted new staff with open arms. You have done well, my friends, but your work will never be done!

It is my observation that the congregation of LUMC will never be totally comfortable with the status quo—and this is a good thing! I have also been aware of the fact that this is a "congregationally led" church and is not dependent on the ideas or direction of the pastor. I have seen an evolution of ministries take place and find that to be exciting and encouraging and it has been a privilege to be part of this community.

Along the way, there may have been (and still might be!) hurt feelings and bruised egos. Commandment Five states: "thou shalt try to mend fences" and, once again, opens with Paul's words, this time from 2 Corinthians 5:18:

God...through Christ reconciled us to himself, and gave us the ministry of reconciliation.

Sometimes, we get so caught up in what we are doing that we forget that we are really in the business of loving and caring with open hearts. We often think that what we are doing has no effect on the people around us and

neglect the feelings of those we care about the most. At these places, it is critical that Jesus be at the forefront of our thinking and doing...which really goes back to the Thessalonians passage!

Being grateful for the gifts and opinions of all the members of our family is the first step in being able to avoid the pitfalls of hurt. Once words of anger are spoken, it is impossible to "put the toothpaste back into the tube." It is, however, possible to find love and forgiveness in the midst of hurt. So, for those times when I have been thoughtless, I ask for your forgiveness... and for those times when you have been thoughtless, I forgive you. It's that simple. Thank you, Saint Paul!


Adult Mission Dinner at Rescue Mission
