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

Hymnal Survey Results

Just over 19,000 people responded to the surveys about United Methodist music and worship practices and hymnal. In the months leading up to General Conference, the General Board of Discipleship conducted a series of six online research surveys about the opinions of United Methodists—pastors, musicians, worship leaders, and laity—on a variety of subjects related to United Methodist worship, congregational singing, and the 1989 United Methodist Hymnal and *The Faith We Sing*, which was published in 2000.

The following are some survey results:

- The top three favorites found in the *United* Methodist Hymnal are "Amazing Grace," "Here I Am, Lord," and "How Great Thou
- The top three favorite hymns in The Faith We Sing are "The Summons," "I'll Fly Away," and "As the Deer."
- The hymn currently in the hymnal that received the most requests to be retained in a new hymnal is "Eternal Father, Strong to
- The three pieces not currently in either book that received the most requests for inclusion in a new hymnal are: "Love Lifted Me." "Open the Eyes of My Heart," and "God Bless America."

- 75% would like to have healing services in the
- 43% want more praise choruses in the hymnal:
- 70% sing the melodies of our hymns; 61% will sing harmony when it is provided.
- 70% are comfortable using male-only language for God. 25% are comfortable using female language for God. 42% are comfortable using male or female language for
- 28% prefer to sing lyrics on a screen. 70% prefer to use a hymnal or songbook.
- 65% prefer Wesley texts with their traditional
- 33% prefer contemporary tunes.

Triple Play

Ttend to think in threes, especially when it Loomes to important aspects of my faith life. Maybe this has to do with the central place of the Trinity in Christian theology (Father, Son and Holy Spirit). Or maybe the three days between Good Friday and Easter Sunday have impressed the number three on my mind. Perhaps it's connected with Wesley's General Rules for Methodists, do no harm, do good, and stay in love with God. Or maybe I just can't remember more than three things at one time (that's certainly true when it comes to grocery lists. Milk, eggs, bread, and butter...better write it down!).

Whatever the cause, I think in threes. For example, last month I did a sermon series on the three greatest gifts a Christian receives: the gift of Christ, the gift of Community, and the gift of Service.

Now, I want to focus on the three basic time commitments we are asked to give to God and the church. I'm doing this for practical reasons: your Nominating Committee is busy recruiting people to fulfill ministry responsibilities for the next 12 months. It's an awesome task to fill a huge need, and every one of us must do our part. So here's a "rule of three" to help guide us in giving time to God and the church. Simple put, I think every church member should give three hours a week: (1) an hour for worship Sunday morning; (2) an hour for study some time during the week, either during Sunday School, a Bible study, or a small group; and (3) an hour of service to help the church fulfill its mission to invited, connect, equip and send

out disciples of Jesus Christ for the sake of the

My sense is that most of us manage the hour of worship with the least difficulty, although we may need to increase our regularity. It's important to attend Sunday morning worship as often as you are able. It's like regular exercise: doing it regularly is what builds strength and health. The hour of study is probably the next easiest, although I think we need to create many more opportunities for this to happen. Our children have it best with multiple Sunday School classes. We adults need to have more opportunities and take regular advantage of them. I'm guessing the hour of service is the most

difficult for many of us, but I'm wondering if that's because we think about it all wrong. Service seems daunting to time-strapped people. Yet, if every able church member gave the equivalent of one hour a week to the ministries of our church, there's nothing we couldn't do. Some of us would choose to do this every week while others would do most of our time in large blocks, such as during Rummage sale or Vacation Bible School. But if each of us gave about an hour a week, we'd be in good shape.

In fact, if each of us followed this simple "rule of three," I think we could more easily say "yes" and "no" to opportunities. Why not try it out and see? And let me know after awhile if it

Make Plans for Summer Camp


We in the North Central New York Conference are fortunate to have two different summer camps to choose from: Casowasco and Aldersgate. Now is a good time to take a look at the programs offered by these two great camps, and sign up! Lansing UMC will pay all or part of the cost of camp for every child who signs up You do not have to be church member! You do not have to be a Methodist! We want to send you to camp! This is an open invitation.

Camp Aldersgate is located on the edge of the Adirondack Park, about three hours from Lansing. It features swimming and boating in Lake Pleasant (a small lake) and access to the much larger Brantingham Lake, as well as the secluded Lake of the Woods. Camp Aldersgate offers over 40 programs and that vary in length from a couple of days to a week long. In addition to all of the "camp favorites" like swimming, arts and crafts, and hiking, the camp offers other activities like the aquapark, ice cream for breakfast and horseback riding!

Camp Casowasco is on the western shore of Owasco Lake, about 30 minutes from Lansing. In addition to its lakeside facilities, Casowasco has a wooded highland area, which offers additional activities. Casowasco has over 50 programs available this summer. Many of them fill up fast, because they are fun.

A Solid Foundation

Camp gives children a solid foundation that lasts a lifetime, and equips vouth for success at school, at home, at church, and in the world by building them up and giving them the gifts of con-




fidence, faith in God, and a healthy self-esteem. Campers just don't hear about something, they do it! Everything at camp is hands on, feet on, and heads up. Campers become interested, get involved, and achieve.

Our programs are run and campers are cared for by a group of people who are passionate about the effect they can have on a camper's life. All are chosen for their maturity, personal integrity, skills, patience, and desire to be Christian role models for youth. Staff and volunteers are carefully screened and supervised by camping professionals. Both staff and volunteers undergo valuable training in health and safety, child development, teaching methods, and group dynamics.

The Message

The faith message we send is a message that encourages youth to grow in their love and knowledge of Jesus Christ. An essential part of the camp experience is spiritual growth—gaining a better understanding of what it means to be a Christian in relationship to God, to others, and to the environment. Though these are United Methodist camps, about 25 percent of our campers come from other churches or have no church affiliation. Adult leaders are sensitive to the differing backgrounds represented, as they present God's word and love as shown in Jesus Christ. Programs are designed to be age appropriate and include music, worship, drama, Bible exploration, and prayer.

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Worship in May

I'm thinking we could pretty much call the month of May Holy Spirit Month. It's the month we'll celebrate Pentecost, the day the Holy Spirit came upon the early church, energizing its members to carry the good news around the world. We'll also witness the continuation of the Spirit's work as five youth step forward to be confirmed (to publicly affirm their faith and take on the vows of full church membership). As hands are laid upon each person's head, I will pray that "the Holy Spirit work in you, that being born by water and the Spirit, you will be a faithful disciple of Jesus Christ." My hope is these reminders of the Spirit's presence and work among us will ignite a flame of ministry in each of us.

May 4—Seventh Sunday of Easter: Today's gospel lesson some have called by some the real "Lord's Prayer," because in it Jesus doesn't teach his disciples to pray but actually prays for them. As we reflect on this prayer today, I wonder what Jesus is praying for concerning us. (We will also celebrate communion this morning with bread baked by our 3rd & 4th grade Sunday School class) Read: Psalm 68:1-10, 32-35; 1 Peter 4:12-14: 5:6-11; and John 17:1-11.

May 11—Pentecost and Mothers Day: Today we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit to the Church and thank our mothers for their love and care. What's the connection between parenting and the ministry of the Holy Spirit? Wear RED TODAY, and give Mom a RED ROSE! Read: Acts 2:1-21; Psalm 104:24-34, 35b; 1 Corinthians 12:3b-13; and John 7:37-39.

May 18—Trinity Sunday and Confirmation Sunday: Five young people will affirm their faith in Christ and invite the Holy Spirit to fill their lives and direct their steps. Note: youth will be present for both services but the actually Rite of Confirmation will be observed only at the 11:00 service. Read: Genesis 1:1-2:4a; Psalm 8; 2 Corinthians 13:11-13; and Matthew 28:16-20.

May 25—Second Sunday after Pentecost: In today's gospel Jesus tells his disciples "do not worry" about possessing the necessities of life. His first audience was comprised of poor folks who often worried quite literally where their next meal was coming from. What was Jesus' thinking when he said this? And what does he intend for so many of us with all our worries and abundance? Read: Isaiah 49:8-16a; Psalm 131; 1 Corinthians 4:1-5; and Matthew 6:24-34.

We have received a thank you from Casowasco, and LUMC's name will appear on a paver or two in the courtyard.

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Church World Service Kits

LUMC Delivers!

Peg McKenzie advises us that Lansing UMC is about to send some 500 kits to Church World Service to be sent wherever they are needed in this country and around the world. With the assistance of many Lansing neighbors, we will be sending 272 school kits, 134 hygeine kits, and 92 baby kits, give or take a few, Peg says.

This is an ongoing effort, and here's how you can participate. Bring in items for the kits, or donate money to help ship them or purchase needed items.

As you see, shipping costs \$2 per kit. That means our shipping bill this time out is \$1,000. You can donate money to help defray this cost.

The only thing to remember about the kits is that they must contain exactly the items specified. Otherwise the system does not work.

Here are the kit contents:

Hygeine Kit (formerly health kit)

- One hand towel measuring approximately 16" x 28" (no fingertip or bath towels)
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb
- One nail clipper (no metal files or emery boards)
- One bar of soap (bath size in wrapper)
- One toothbrush (in original packaging)
- Six Band-Aids®

Church World Service adds toothpaste to the Hygiene Kit just prior to shipment, so toothpaste is not something we can donate here (due to expiration date issues).

Hygiene Kit value: \$11

Processing/Shipping Cost: \$2 per Kit

School Kit:

- One pair of blunt scissors (rounded tip)
- Three 70-count spiral or tape-bound pads of 8" x 10-1/2" ruled paper or pads with 200-210 sheets of ruled paper. (loose-leaf or filler paper does not work.)
- One 30-centimeter ruler (12")
- One hand-held pencil sharpener
- One large eraser
- Six new pencils with erasers
- One box of 24 crayons (exactly 24)
- One 12" x 14" to 14" x 16" finished size cotton cloth bag with cloth handles

Pack all items inside a cloth bag. The pattern is available from Peg McKenzie. It takes a half yard of any cotton fabric..

School Kit value: \$13

Processing/Shipping Cost: \$2 per Kit

Baby Kit:

- Six cloth diapers
- Two T-shirts or undershirts (no onesies)
- Two washcloths
- Two gowns or sleepers
- Two diaper pins
- One sweater or sweatshirt
- Two receiving blankets (one can be a hand-knitted or crocheted baby blanket)

All items should be new. This is not the place for hand me downs (that's what the rummage sale is for). Patterns are available for the gown and for the sweater..

Baby Kit value: \$39

Processing/Shipping Cost: \$2 per Kit

Spiritual Renewal & Retreats

The church library has a new appearance. The library is located in the office space that I occupy and it has a new spring look with some new books. We are trying to keep the library updated and you are welcome to borrow books. First, the library has an assortment of Bibles—children's bibles, youth bibles, and adult bibles. We have contemporary bibles, such as Eugene Peterson's The Message, and traditional translations--like the King James Version. Study

groups often appreciate various translations. Please help yourself. We have books from local authors. We have the autobiography of one of our own congregation members! That is a signed copy of My Love Affair With Life, by Grey Larison. Other books range in topics from Christianity, World Religions, prayer, parenting, women's ministries, balancing life, Sabbath Time, and spiritual classics by such authors as C.S. Lewis and Richard Foster. We have books that are sometimes referenced in the Sunday morning sermons. One of the books I have recently enjoyed reading was A Mile in My Shoes, by Trevor Hudson. Hudson is a pastor in the Methodist Church as well as a conference and retreat leader. He begins a chapter in his book by quoting a familiar Bible passage "come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens and I will give you rest."(Matthew 11:28) Hudson applies Jesus' words to our lives by saying "In this inner resting place we release dependence upon words, lay aside busy thoughts, and put down constant doing. Persevering in this quiet way renews our spirit, refreshes our souls and replenishes our energies." Whenever I read such inspiring words, I'm ready--sign me up!!
