


T'm a bit conflicted. On the one hand, I don't **▲**like hype when it comes to the Christian faith. I'm suspicious of catchy slogans, flashy logos, self-described "exciting" programs, and "big" events designed to capture and hold my attention. I cringe when I see the Christian faith hawked like a new product on the supermarket shelf. Life in Christ isn't another commodity for sale in the market place.

Yet I also understand the need for promotion and advertising in the church. Too often the good things that happen in a church like ours are largely unknown outside the four walls of the church building. In fact, many within those four walls are unaware of what's going on. As Jesus implied, churches have a tendency to act like a lamp hid under a bushel basket. Why shouldn't the most important endeavor in the world—inviting, connecting, equipping, and sending disciples of Jesus Christ—benefit from the best promotional techniques available?

I guess the key is balance (it usually is). I hope we've struck that balance as we've attempted to promote our *Three Simple Rules* program

(which begins September 14th) with posters, announcements, and bulletin and newsletter articles. We're sure not trying to sell anything. but we are excited by what's in Bishop Job's little book, and we didn't want any one to be left out because they didn't get the word.

The truth is, the only nifty promotional material we have to give you is a really nice bookmark! But all kidding aside, I think God will bless you for every effort you make to benefit from this special time in the life of our congregation. So pick up a copy of the book and read it. 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Worship in September



One of the big "debates" among preachers is whether the main aim of preaching should be to teach a lesson about faith or invite a decision for faith? In other words, is a sermon is essentially instructional or inspirational? I've never been much for "either–or" thinking, so I've resolved the dilemma by looking at good preaching as "both–and." It seems to me a good sermon expands both our understanding of the faith and our capacity to live out that faith.

I know that's the sort of preaching I'm aiming for during September as we begin our exploration of Rueben Job's book, *Three Simple Rules*: **Do no harm**;

do good; and stay in love with God. I think there's a lot we could learn about these three essential elements of the Christian life. By attending worship each Sunday, you'll be sure to grow in your understanding, (especially if you build on the worship experience by reading *Three Simple Rules* yourself, attend Sunday School, and participate in a *3SR* small group). But in addition to increased understanding, I hope you'll emerge from worship each Sunday more committed and able to translate these rules into practice. If you're able to do no harm, do some good and stay in love with God Monday morning, then I know what we've done Sunday morning will have hit the mark.—*P.B.*

September 7—What do you do when you feel a member of the church has injured you? Jesus has an answer to this question, one we'd all do well to learn or be reminded of. Read: Exodus 12:1-14; Psalm 149; Romans 13:8-14; and Matthew 18:15-20.

September 14—"Needing a Change." We begin our five-week series based on Three Simple Rules by acknowledging we all need a change – a change of heart and life. None of us is a fully developed Christian person. In our more honest moments, we know this. But what sort of changes do we need to make and how do we make them? Theme text: Mark 12:28-34.

September 21—"**Doing No Harm**." When asked by the first Methodists how they should

begin to live a Christian life, John Wesley told them to "first, do no harm." Keep from hurting others with your words and deeds. It's not as easy as it sounds, but the benefits to self and others are enormous. Theme text: Romans 12:9-21.

September 28—"**Doing Good.**" Wesley challenged Methodists to "do as much good as you can." Christians, according to Wesley, were to be a force for good in the world. In a world with such enormous needs, what particular good deeds are you called to do? Theme text: Micah 6:6-8.

The series continues in October.

October 5—Staying in Love with God. October 12—Keep Growing.

As many of you already know, the adults begin a five-week discussion of the book *Three Simple Rules*, by Rueben Job, during the regular Sunday School hour. Pastor Bill plans to lead the class, showing a video of the author's presentation of the theme that we hope will generate a group discussion. You are also invited to participate in the **small groups** that will meet weekly at designated homes.

Women's Bible Study Group convenes on Wednesday, September 17, at 9:30 AM in the North Lansing double classroom. Jan Nagel leads the study on 2Corinthians, and I assure you that you will leave the class knowing biblical details that you may not have been previously familiar with. Newcomers are always welcome.

The Children's Sunday School Program kicks off this year with topics that coincide with the adult study. The first three units are entitled Respect: The Golden Rule (Do Good), Love Your Enemies (Do No Harm), and The Ten Commandments (Staying In Love with God). Some other upcoming programs will include the study of the *Methodist Discipline and Book of Resolutions*. **Disciple Bible Study** begins in October. 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Distribution of Jo Ernstein's Biography and Memorial Fund

T ast month fifty copies of Jo Ernstein's biogra-Lphy were sent across the country to friends of Jo who had contributed to her memorial fund. These were former students, fellow teachers, and missionaries who worked with Jo, before and during the time that she originated our Haiti

Connection (mission) in 1968. In the past year 250 more copies were distributed locally, principally to people in our congregation.

Copies were also presented to the History Center, Tompkins County Library, Ithaca High School Library (where Jo was a teacher), and Cornell Archives: Josephine Ernstein Collection (Jo was an alumna).

In a cover letter, friends were told that the Haiti Committee at LUMC added the money from a generous gift to the program from Bob and Jean

Jolly (long-time members of LUMC) to the Memorial Fund. After much discussion, it was determined that Jo would appreciate a continued effort to train Haitian teachers. That task was her

initial intention in going to Haiti. A portion of these funds was used to sponsor a four-school, five-day seminar for teachers. The faculties from Banique Methodist Primary School, L'Ecole la Providence (Baptist), and Mispah School (private) attended. The staff from the fourth school,

> Gerald Augustine's school, attended at its own expense. The instruction for this seminar for about 25 teachers was given by the Methodist Normal School faculty.

There is enough money for another seminar, tentatively planned for August 2009.

Our sincere thanks to those generous and dedicated LUMC members who helped make Jo's biography a reality: Judy Hinderliter (author), Glenn Withiam (editor), and Pat Gillespie (production manager). How I started channeling George Bailey

Well, I don't exactly get much money myself, but I do work hard for other people to put a little cash in their pockets. Many of you have been asking what it is I do exactly? I'll try to sum it up a bit for you.

I was appointed to work with the Episcopal Presbyterian Relief Agency (EPDRA) an NGO established by the EP Church, which has a large following in the Volta Region of Ghana (where my site is located). Before I arrived it had been traditionally an agriculture assistance program devoted to workshops to help local farmers improve production and planting methods. Recently before my arrival my counterpart (a 50-year-old woman who has completed high school but has no other formal education) changed the program from agriculturally focused to microfinance assistance.

Most people in rural Ghana, and most parts of sub-Saharan Africa for that matter, have little to no access to traditional banks. We are used to having savings accounts, checking accounts, online banking and bill paying, and relatively easy access for loans. Unfortunately those are foreign concepts for most small business owners so they're forced to result to stuffing their savings under the matress.

Before my arrival my counterpart was working to give out loans and collect the payments for those loans, but a year ago the EPDRA lost its funding (formerly it was taken care of financially by Bread for the World, an NGO from Germany) and has been scrambling to cover basic operating expenses since then. Essentially,m I walked into an NGO that had little to no money, but whose goal was to better other people's lives by offering them loans. Needless to say I had my work cut out for me.

Since my arrival we've tried to come up with solutions to the whole lack of funding and do things a little differently. We've established what is called a "susu" group. Essentially this is a savings and loan organization created by and for the people who choose to join the group. Each person chooses to contribute a certain amount of money each day. We have people giving 20 cents a day up to 10 dollars a day. At the end of each month each person can choose to either withdraw their contributions for the month, which gives them a lump sum of money (essentially a mini loan), or contribute all of the daily payments to their savings account to be withdrawn at a later time. After an individual has been a regular participant for six months they will be eligible for additional loans, but we are only in our fifth month, so we haven't quite gotten that far.

Besides our susu group I have worked with my counterpart to set up an office for our microfinance operation. So far it isn't anything exciting--a room with two desks, a couple of chairs, and a ceiling fan--but I'm working on writing a proposal to get the money to put a computer and printer-copier in there. Unfortunately my trusty laptop finally kicked the bucket (it gave me a solid five years of service), so my computer training with Ghanaian colleagues here has reached a standstill, hopefully to be resumed when the new computer comes to town.

Working here can be an adventure, a headache, and an inspiration all in one day, but so far so good. :)

Hope you are all enjoying new and old jobs or school. My sympathies to those of you who are slaving away, working for the man with a 9-5. © Just kidding.
