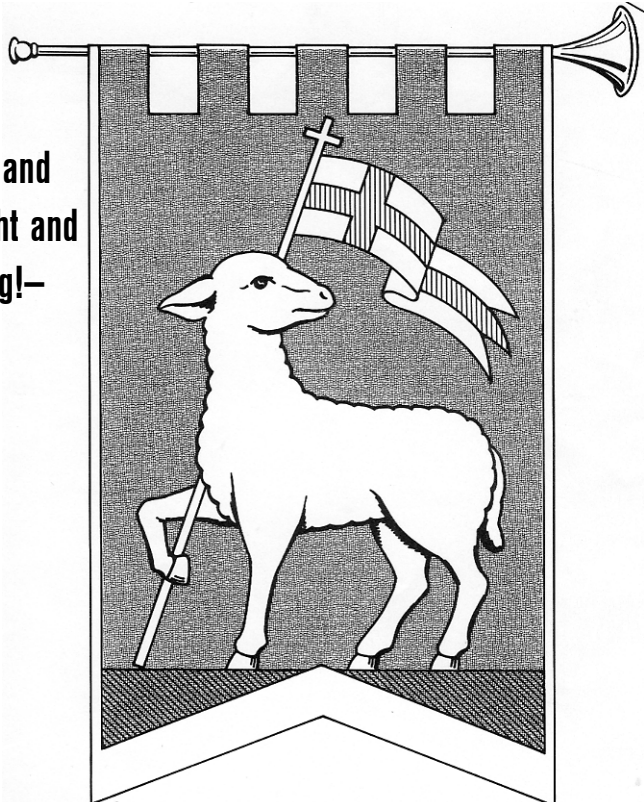

A Savory Mixture

From the Pastor

Occasionally when I sit down to write my “pastor’s column,” I struggle to find something to share. This month I face the opposite problem: I’ve got many things I want to share with you. So, call this column “pastor’s potpourri!”

- **My Study Leave:** As you read this, I’m about two months away from taking my eight-week study leave. I’ll be spending much of June with Dori and the girls in England and then most of July in Lansing reading and reflecting. The theme guiding my leave is “missional leadership.” Specifically, I’ll be searching for ways to share the good things of Christ with people who currently know next to nothing about him. Methodism’s John Wesley and Celtic Christianity’s St. Aidan will be my “teachers.” While in England, I’ll be visiting historic sites and seeking fresh insights. Back “in the States,” I’ll be looking around our neighborhood for new ways to connect with people we aren’t currently reaching. During this time the District Superintendent (DS) and Staff-Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) have relieved me of all my pastoral duties, including preaching and pastoral care. Since I’ve worn a “pastor’s stole” for seventeen years, I know it’s going to take some discipline to set aside my duties for a time.

Thankfully, the pastoral needs of the congregation will be well cared for by two seasoned and familiar pastors: The Reverends Rollie Ryan and Dave Nicholls. Rollie and his wife Susanne

and Dave and his wife Maxine have worshipped at LUMC for some time. I’m personally grateful that Rollie and Dave have stepped forward to preach and provide pastoral care while I’m away. I know you’ll be in good hands. Our annual conference’s Board of Ordained Ministry has also stepped forward to help us by providing \$1,500 dollars for interim pastoral support.

- **Envisioning a New Conference:** Two years ago Bishop Fisher asked me to chair a taskforce for our North Central New York annual conference charged with entering into conversation with three geographically adjacent annual conferences (Western New York, which adjoins our conference on the west, Troy, which extends from Albany through the eastern Adirondacks and western Vermont to the Canadian border, and Wyoming, which extends from Binghamton and Oneonta to Scranton). Our annual conference is the basic unit of the United Methodist Church akin to a Roman Catholic diocese. It is a regional body, an organizational unit, and a yearly meeting. The four annual conferences soon discovered we share much in common: financial challenges, changing demographics and membership losses, and a longing for a better future. It soon became evident one way to prepare for that better future was to form a new conference out of these four. This spring and fall members of these four annual conferences will be discerning whether this is the direction we are being led to follow. As one part of this discernment process, LUMC will host a “Discernment Meeting” next

month (May 15, 7-9 p.m.) to provide information about the New Conference Vision and receive feedback. You are encouraged to attend this event. I also ask for your prayers as I continue to provide leadership to this project. This has been one of the most challenging responsibilities I’ve been asked to fulfill.

- **Renewing a Focus on Adult Spiritual Formation:** A number of experiences have convinced me that the number-one priority for us in the future is renewing our focus on adult spiritual formation. We are doing pretty well with our children and youth. Improvement is always possible, but our Sunday school and youth programs are faith-building, fun, and growing. Our adult ministries are all of those things, too, but we need more adult opportunities. Growing adults bring children to church; growing adults step up to take leadership; growing adults enjoy abundant life. When it comes to adult offerings, what limits us more than anything else is space. We have room for just one adult class on Sunday morning. Sunday morning is prime time for us. If we don’t reach people on Sunday morning, we won’t reach them. That’s why as we continue to search for ways to find resources for our growing needs, I’m more and more convinced the place to start is adult Sunday school space.

So, that’s what’s on my heart and mind. I hope you find in this “potpourri” a bit of Easter color and the bouquet of resurrection fragrance. Surely the Risen Christ is working among us, leading us forward into the future.

Worship in April

The first week of April provides us with four opportunities to meet God through worship: Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday. Not everyone's schedule will allow so many times in worship, but most of us will make 3 out of 4. What a journey of heart and soul this will be! I'm reminded of the praise song "Lord I Lift Your Name on High" I sang with our confirmands during our March retreat:

You came from Heaven to Earth,	From The Cross to the grave,
To show The Way,	From the grave to the sky,
From the Earth to The Cross,	Lord I lift Your Name on High!
My debt You paid,	

The song captures the movement the events of that fateful week we call "Holy Week." As we commemorate this week through our worship, our hope and prayer is we, too, may experience great movement in our hearts and souls.

April 1—Palm and Passion Sunday – A service of story and song led by our choir. Come journey with Jesus through the last week of his earthly ministry. You will become part of the crowd watching...and participating in...the events in Jerusalem leading to Jesus' crucifixion.

April 5—Maundy Thursday. 6:00 PM. "Do this in remembrance of me." We will relive Jesus' last supper with his disciples as we share a simple supper followed by a simple service of bread and cup. Read: Exodus 12:1-14; Psalm 116:1-2, 12-19; 1 Corinthians 11:23-26; and John 13:1-17, 31b-35.

April 6—Good Friday. 7:00 PM. New this year is an opportunity to worship together in our sanctuary the evening of Good Friday. As we work our way, verse by verse, through the wonderful African-American spiritual, "Were You There," three contemporary witnesses will share what the cross means to them.

April 8—Easter Sunday: Three services of worship to celebrate our Lord's Resurrection: Sunrise Service (6:00 AM) in our Butterfly Garden, with refreshments to follow; and

two Worship Services (8:30 and 11:00 AM) in the sanctuary with choir and brass ensemble. Read: Acts 10:34-43; Psalm 118:1-2, 14-24; 1 Corinthians 15:19-26; and John 20:1-18 (or Luke 24:1-12).

April 15—Second Sunday of Easter. What do you do if you missed Easter? I mean, the lilies are gone now, and the choir's not going to sing all that wonderful music again, and we're certainly not going to get the brass ensemble back any time soon. But what if the Risen Christ was willing to stop by again, just for you? Outrageous idea? Check out Thomas's story. Read: Acts 5:27-32; Psalm 150; Revelation 1:4-8; and John 20:19-31.

April 22—Third Sunday of Easter. Sometimes what we need most is right before us; we just can't see it. Such is the story of Cleopas and his friend as they flee Jerusalem Easter Sunday night. As we remember their story, perhaps our eyes will be opened to what (who?) is right before eyes. Read: Acts 9:1-20; Psalm 30; Revelation 5:11-14; and Luke 24: 13-35.

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Responding To God's Will

"There are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone." (1 Corinthians 12:4-6).

Do we discern God's will in our lives? Do we prayerfully seek God's purpose in our lives, being open to His will, and naming that gift?

We have certainly been a witness to God's presence in the lives of some of the young people here at church. They have been seeking and responding to God's call. C.J. Griffin attended a conference a few months ago on pursuing a career in Youth Ministry. He is considering this field of study as he graduates from high school.

CJ will share his hopes, dreams and what a vocation in ministry entails on Sunday, April 1, in the adult Sunday School class. Nicole Earl was selected to travel with 19 other youth on a Mission for Peace trip to Nicaragua. (Please read Nicole's moving article of her time away and the blessings she received as a result of this trip.) Nicole will highlight her mission trip on Sunday, April 15, during Sunday School hour. Please join us as we listen to these young people respond to God's call in their lives. Mahima Walter, Sarah

Sandsted, Ashley Dean and Kelsey Radcliff were among the young adults who participated in the Haiti mission trip this year. We anxiously await a date to hear about their journey.

There are also opportunities here at church to respond to God's call and share one's spiritual gifts. The Christian Education program with a rotation Sunday School curriculum invites many to participate as teachers, shepherds, and assistants. Please prayerfully consider becoming involved next fall. The Adult Ministry Committee seeks your help in expanding the program and vision. Adult Ministry is responsible for Women's Bible Study, Sunday's adult forum, Lectionary bible study, and other small group studies. Please consider serving on this committee as growing in faith is a lifetime journey.

With so many new faces among us, we encourage you to prayerfully discern God's will in your life.—*Marilyn Paradise*

April 29—Fourth Sunday of Easter. Hard to imagine a name for Jesus more precious to his followers than "Good Shepherd." When we call Jesus this, what are we saying about him? (And what are we saying about ourselves!?) Read: Acts 9:36-43; Psalm 23; Revelation 7:9-17; and John 10:22-30.

Mission of Peace to Nicaragua

For two and a half weeks this past December and January, I was one of 19 youth that had the opportunity to go on a Mission of Peace trip to the beautiful country of Nicaragua. This trip was amazing. At first I was apprehensive of going. I don't speak Spanish and I've never considered myself an outgoing person, but I am so thankful that I went. On this trip, I was with youth from all over the Northeastern Jurisdiction. We had youth from Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, and West Virginia. When we first arrived in Nicaragua, I was surprised at the scene. We stayed in Managua, the capital city. It was very much a city, with fast-food restaurants, Coca Cola advertisements, and McDonald's. All of this in the second-poorest nation in the Western Hemisphere. That was surprising, but we soon found out that Nicaragua was not all fast-food-filled cities.

The most emotional portion of this trip for me happened on the seventh and eighth days of the trip. We went to Project Chacocente and La Churreca. Project Chacocente was a project inspired by Mission of Peace and created by Cheryl (Charito) Avery, our translator and guide, as a reaction to La Churreca. La Churreca is the Managua city garbage dump, where approximately 100 families live. These families live at the dump, and off of the dump. They recycle materials by using them in their own homes at the dump, or by selling them to other families.

Project Chacocente is a place of hope for the people of the dump who have no other alternative. Currently there are eight families involved in Project Chacocente. The families are interviewed and then are picked to be moved from the dump to Project Chacocente,

a rural land. Once at Project Chacocente, the families must work with Charito and other leaders to build their homes, work the land, create a business, and become active society members, something they never had the opportunity to do before. After five years of living like this and learning and growing, the house and about two acres of land is theirs to keep. This project is fairly new. It was started in 2003.

The first time we were at the project, I was taking pictures of the Project Chacocente kids. These kids all loved having their pictures taken. One boy kept jumping in front of the camera in every shot I took, making funny faces. Through the whole tour of Project Chacocente that Charito was giving us, this boy held my hand and would point things out to me. Even though I couldn't understand him, that didn't stop him from wanting to tell me everything. At the end of our tour, when we were about to leave, this little boy, Elvin, handed me a bracelet that he had made. The next day we returned to Project Chacocente and I immediately searched for Elvin. We found each other and were around each other for the remainder of the days that I was at Project Chacocente.

While there, we were working on different houses, adding onto them and helping build parts of them. At the house I was at, we were building a cement wall. I was using cement to fill in between the blocks and everything was fine until I reached the top of the block. I couldn't figure out how to smooth off the top of the cement, keeping things even. One of the men helping me, Pedro, was trying to show me how, using arm gestures, and even

with those, I still couldn't figure it out. He then put out his hand, and I went to hand him the trowel so he could quickly finish off the top and we could move on, but as I was handing him the trowel, he communicated that he didn't want it. He then placed his hand over mine and showed me exactly how to smooth off the top. Pedro understood that I didn't speak his language and he knew that he could have had the wall finished in half the time it took us, but he didn't care. He wanted us there and he wanted to work beside us and help us learn how to do the work.

Pedro was so patient the entire time I was with him. He would explain things in a way we could understand, and he never got frustrated when we didn't get it. He was amazing.

I learned through Elvin and Pedro that love is truly unconditional, and it knows no boundaries. It doesn't matter what language you speak, love first and everything else will fall into place. I also learned on this trip that life is precious and beautiful. When we were at La Churreca, I saw shining smiling faces, and I learned the definition of life.

They were truly happy while living in a dump. Appreciate life, be happy, show patience, and love unconditionally. That is what I learned on this trip.

Another call for school supplies

At June 2007 Annual Conference in Liverpool, the plan is to load a shipping container (8' x 8' x 20') with school supplies for United Methodist Missions in Zimbabwe. Churches are asked to take a collection of school supplies (different list from Church World Service): paper, pens, pencils, children's books for all ages and grades (not textbooks), crayons, construction paper, notebooks, binders, and related items. Also, health-related and hygiene items such as toothbrushes and soap will also be welcome.

The conference mission team visited UM missions in Zimbabwe in July 2006. The economic situation there deteriorates. Inflation is at 1600% or worse. It is extremely difficult for schools and hospitals to obtain the necessary teaching tools to educate the children. United Methodist schools at Mutumbara and Old Mutare will directly benefit from this effort.

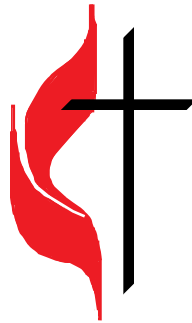
