From the Pastor

A Time Apart

By the time you receive this copy of the *Sunbeam*, I'll have begun my 8-week sabbatical leave (June 4–July 29). Dori, the girls, and I will spend the first part of that period in England, retracing some of the footsteps of Methodism's John Wesley and Celtic Christianity's missionary-bishop St. Aidan. When we return here in July, I'll spend the second half of my leave reading, reflecting, and resting.

I'm enormously grateful for this opportunity: grateful to the Louisville Institute and our annual conference for financial support; grateful to the Reverends Dave Nicholls and Rollie Ryan for taking over some of my responsibilities; and grateful to you for allowing me this time. I know we'll miss each other and be glad when we are together again the first Sunday in August, but I also know God will bless us even while we are apart from one another.

Back in May during Sunday school I shared some hopes and dreams for my sabbatical time. In that presentation I referenced my application to the Louisville Institute where I named my longing to "connect" with Wesley and Aidan to learn how they helped non-church people become friends of Jesus. Though these men lived a long time ago (over 1,300 years ago in Aidan's case), their world and our world share some things in common. They both lived and worked in contexts where

the Christian faith was either unknown or forgotten. Yet, unlike many nineteenth century European and American missionaries, whose style of evangelism could often be overbearing, disrespectful, and imperialistic, the approach of St. Aidan and John Wesley was to embrace the good they found in the native culture while at the same time sharing the transforming good news of new life in Christ.

I think this is a healthy, balanced approach to connecting people with Jesus. Inspired by Wesley and Aidan, I hope to gain a new perspective on how a church can connect non-Christians with the living Christ.

That's my plan for this experience; what God will do through this time is up to God. Often the things I thought I wanted to learn weren't the things I learned or needed to learn. I know when I'm back among you in August I'll have stories to share. You, no doubt, will too. It will be good to catch up and continue our journey together.

Until then, God bless you! I'll keep you in my prayers and ask you to do the same for the Gottschalk-Fieldings.

On Appreciation

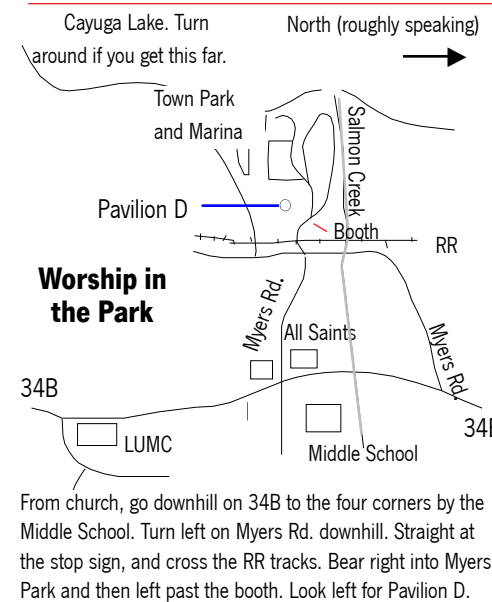
Dear Parents,

Kansas Tornado Relief

Kansas was hit heavily by tornadoes May 4, 5, and 6, with more than 70 tornados reportedly sighted throughout the state. Greensburg, Kansas, a town of 1,600, was obliterated on May 4. The Greensburg United Methodist Church and parsonage were destroyed. Nine people were killed as the tornado traveled through the area.

In addition to Greensburg, other communities were hit May 5, including Trousdale, northeast of Greensburg, and rural Bennington, north of Salina. More tornados damaged residences near Longford, Kansas, northeast of Salina. The Trousdale United Methodist Church was heavily damaged. Heavy rainfall and flooding has forced evacuations throughout central and eastern Kansas as the storm continued to pelt the region.

UMCOR is assisting the people of Greensburg to respond to the May 4 tornado. UMCOR has issued an emergency grant to the Kansas West Annual Conference to help

with any initial needs. Additionally, UMCOR disaster consultant Cherri Baer is in Kansas to provide on site support to conference staff as they make their initial assessments and determine their next steps in recovery.

Please lift up this town in your prayers. You can give by writing a check to LUMC with a memo of Midwest Tornado Emergencies (UMCOR Advance #901680) or give online at gbgm-umc.org. UMCOR is now using this Advance to better accommodate the generous response of United Methodists to this emergency.

Church World Service News Upstate Update

CWS Tools & Blankets

Families displaced by flooding and tornados in recent months feel the comfort of CWS blankets as they find temporary shelter and make plans for the future.

Rev. Jerry Kilgore, pastor of Presbyterian Church in Bound Brook, New Jersey, handed out blankets following severe flooding on the East Coast in April 2007. "At least one thing many survivors of the flooding do have is a gray blanket. People found out we had blankets and they started showing up. A lot of them have lost everything but they know they can come here and get a blanket." Some of the CWS blankets also covered folding cots that were stretched out in "every nook and cranny" of the church.

Recent floods in Aceh Province in Indonesia have also swept away people's belongings and all their possessions. Livelihoods have been lost and the people of Aceh face an uphill battle in the coming years.

CWS is assisting with water supplies, sanitation, and shelter. Blankets, health and baby kits, tents, tools, and water purification supplies have been distributed.

CWS Kits

During two days in early May, the interior of a large tractor trailer truck slowly filled with boxes of CWS kits as volunteers and staff at local collection sites across the state loaded kits dropped off from area churches.

Many dozens of these kits were from Lansing UMC, including Baby Kits, Health Kits, and School Kits. The truck returned to the warehouse in New Windsor, Maryland, with almost 9,000 kits from the Upstate New York Region. CWS is deeply grateful to all churches, groups, and individuals who made this possible!

Despite these wonderful efforts, School Kits are still urgently needed.

Church World Service reports that School Kits are being pulled out of arriving deliveries at the warehouse and sent out immediately.

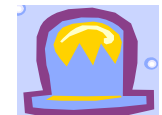

These jobs are all carried out here at home. Going to Haiti is not required, but is possible.

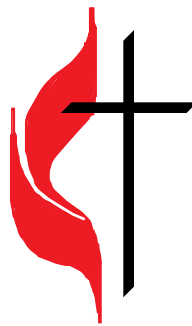
